R I President Kalyan Banerjee, a member of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India since 1972, is the third Indian to service as RI president. Mr. Banerjee is a director of United Phosphorus Limited, the largest agrochemical manufacturer in India, and the chair of United Phosphorus (Bangladesh) Limited. He is a member of the Indian Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Chemical Society, a part president of the Vapi Industries Association and a former chair of the Gujarat chapter of the Confederation of Indian Industry. He earned a degree in chemical engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur in 1964.

Mr. Banerjee has served Rotary as a RI Director, Rotary Foundation Trustee committee and task force chair, International Assembly group discussion leader, RI President's Representative and as District Governer of RI District 3060. He has also served as chair of the South East Asia Regional Polio Plus Committee and as a member of International Polio Plus Committee for many years. Mr. Banerjee is a Major donor, Benefactor and Bequest Society Members. In recognition of his services, he has been awarded TRF's

Citation for Meritorious Service. Mr. Banerjee's better half Binota is a social worker and an Inner Wheel Club member. The couple are blessed with two children and four grand children.

We must support The Rotary Foundation on its Future Vision Plan.

Our third emphasis will be change, and we start by being the change we wish to see in the world ourselves. If we wish for peace, we start by living in peace ourselves, in our homes and in our communities. If we wish environmental degradation to stop, if we wish to reduce child mortality or to prevent hunger, we must be the instrument of that change – and recognize that it must start within us, with each of us.

To bring about the changes, we will need to think out of the box. We need to explore the possibilities of working together with others similarly engaged as we are. Rotary and the United Nations form a symbiotic relationship. We can take this forward by our engagement with the Millennium Development Goals, striving to meet the needs of our communities. The newly approved but well-tested Rotarian Action Groups – working in areas such as safe water, microcredit, AIDS prevention, or literacy – will significantly strengthen our arsenal of weapons to serve both effectively and efficiently. We are in Rotary to change the world, for why else would we be Rotarians? We believe our future will be better than the past.

Two areas where we shall need to constantly revisit our goals are first, finding more Rotarians to do the work of Rotary. We must focus on getting newer, younger, current-generation, You Tubeand Facebook-savvy Rotarians. And the other area we must look at is telling well the story of Rotary to the world. As you go ahead, you will find that what really matters is just your willingness to meet the need, and not the size of the project. The difficult jobs can be done right now. The impossible may take just a bit longer. Along with the big things, let's not ever forget the small gestures that change lives. And you will then see that almost everyone will smile back. Laugh and the world laughs with you.

Let's make our year, in addition to all that we do, a year of laughter and joy and happiness, with at least three smiles each per Rotarian and spouse every day. That's eight million smiles daily. In this life, you will find we may not always be able to do great things. But we can always do small things, with great love. As we get ready to commit a precious year of our lives to Rotary, let us clearly understand that each one of us has a part to play, to perform, to deliver. We cannot simply say that we shall try our best. We need to commit ourselves absolutely, fully, and say what I must do shall indeed be done. Each one of you will succeed because the resolve and strength to do this - to do anything -comes from within yourselves. In order to achieve anything in this world, a person has to use all the resources he can draw on.

The only place to start is with ourselves and within ourselves. And the questions we need to ask ourselves are: Why am I here? Why are you here? It is because we all seek a sense of fulfillment in life, and the responsibilities we are about to take up are a part of that fulfillment.

To achieve the fulfillment, we have to find harmony between our inner self and the outer self; the inner dimensions are our desires, our will, our spirit, and our outer dimension is the action we take and the image we create. That is why I am asking you to reach within and unleash your inner power and then use it to embrace everything and everyone around you. "First reach within yourself, and then move on confidently, firmly, toward the targets you have set for yourselves. Editors Note - Fifty years is a long time in an institutions history. We are reproducing a couple of articles from our members that bring out the history of the institution

Down Memory Lane by PDG Dr. Badar Maskati

joined Rotary in 1964, 2 years after our club was born. It was not easy to get invited to Rotary in those days. PP Hooseni Khorakiwala invited me – incidentally he also preceded me as president of RCBN by a year. I remember him getting Monginis to bake a huge cake for one of our charter nights - some 20 feet long, getting into the record books!

PP Babulal Todi came to KEM Hospital Eye Department on 3 occasions, incognito, to observe me examining and treating patients checking up on my competence as well as temperament, before I was permitted to join. In those days, you had to stay or work within the club territorial boundaries.. RI was very strict. In fact, our club was dragged to court by a member who had pretended to stay at Dadar, only for purposes of fulfilling the address requirement of our club, while actually staying outside club territory. Ultimately we won the case. However, the man refused to guit RCBN, saying he would resign only if PRID Soli Pavri did the same. Soli readily agreed. They both resigned and Soli immediately rejoined RCBN! Hard to imagine that remaining a member of RCBN was worth a court battle!

Soli, our charter President was loaned to us by Bombay club. He went on to lead our club for 2 years and later rose to be DG and RI Director. As per rules he could have chosen to rejoin Bombay Club after our club was formed. However, during my year as President, I had to ask a couple of captains of industry who were RCBN members to resign as they were spending more time attending Bombay Club as visiting Rotarians, than the home club, thus violating the rule of attending 30% meetings of the home club! Attendance rules were enforced very strictly. We were always a 100 plus member club – therefore the current strength of only 80 is very disturbing.

Our annual dues were around Rs.1500/-. We met at Worli dairy for many years and then moved to various venues in our club territory, such as Nehru Planetarium, Jewel of India, Jade Garden, Nehru Science Centre and Poonam Hotel at Worli before moving out of the area.

I was loaned the classification of "Ophthalmology" and soon after joining we started doing cataract and squint surgical camps all over the state of Maharashtra and beyond. RCBN was very supportive. We did a camp every year for 13 years in conjunction with the RC Dombivali, in Dombivali - always the weekend prior to the district conference and wiped out cataract blindness from the adivasi population around Dombivali, doing over 100 cases each camp.

One installation meeting I will never forget is that of the late Ram Batra (he later went on to be Mumbai's sheriff). It was at NSCI and there was such heavy rains that we had no way of going home.. many spent the night in their cars! Another was that of Quresh. Ramesh Khanna was the DG and he had requested clubs to not have formal installations. So RCBN enacted the coronation of Shivaji at the Y.B.Chavan auditorium, complete with authentic costumes and elaborate make-up. It took the audience a while to realise that Shivaji and wife on stage were the club's first couple!

Many of our stalwarts left us to start a Rotary club in heaven; the late Kakubhai Toprani and Jadish Mittra on the eve of their taking over as president; Kirti Vyas and Soli Pavri, the gentleman teachers, Keki Hathi of Godrej, the doyen of HR Ranjan Bannerjee, senior doctors, K.K.Datey, B.N.Purandare, Yahya Kachwala, R.K.Shah (the dramatist par excellence). However, life and Rotary goes on and I am sure RCBN too will make great strides in our Golden Jubilee year and continue to serve the community as we have always done, with zest and humility.

t is now my pleasant duty and proud privilege, amidst joy, to welcome Rotary Club of Bombay North into the MEMBERSHIP OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL.

I congratulate President Soli Pavri and Secretary Parikh, on the selection as first key officers. The birth of a new baby is a very significant event. So also a birth of a New Rotary Club is a very significant event – we must be aware that science has not erased out infantile casualty or infantile sickness of all kinds. Nevertheless, I feel sure that under the dynamic leadership of your President, Bombay North has a tremendous future. Please see that the foundation of the Club continues to remain strong, that the membership is always kept well informed and that you continue to draw gradually upon the forty available classifications, so as to strengthen your club and make it a true cross section of your community. It will be a wise move to keep in touch with your sponsor club and Group Representative.

Small or big, your club is a most important member of our worldwide organization, extending into 128 Countries and geographical regions with a total membership of over 526,500. As you know, every Rotarian is privileged to attend a regular meeting of any other club, in any part of the world.

Though young, you already had a flying start –your Bulletin is revealing your inner spirit of enthusiasm. The hosting of a Rotary Information Institute, in a very successful manner, is another example of the determined interest of your members, in this great ROTARY MOVEMENT.

May I remind you, fellow Rotarians, the message of our President Nitish Chandra Laharry "Kindle the spark within" - FOR THAT is the Power that lights our Path to service. Every man has within him the latent desire to serve the MAN - kind and it will be for us to spark this latency into a world enveloping flame. Rotary was started by Paul P.Harris for fellowship during 1905 and later the ideal of service was adopted by Rotary International. Rotary Clubs must develop "from its very base upwards to its climax of the creation of world fellowship". In other words, our viewpoint must be international brotherhood. When we cultivate this view, the oneness of a mankind is easily appreciated and realized by everybody.

May I request you, the leaders of various avocations, professions, trade and industry, to contribute at least one project substantially this year so that the community may remember you through it, for a long time. Happily enough PRESIDENT NITISH wants us to concentrate on youth service. It will educate the youth and will create good impression for Rotary in their tender minds. Thus, we can make Rotary permanent. If youth appreciate Rotary, we create our successors. Thus, this world organization will be safe in right hands.

The Challenge of the future is to move faster along the four avenues of ROTARY SERVICE and especially towards the goal of International understanding. Each Rotarian must accept his personal challenge: to strengthen club service, for this is the foundation of all service; to serve his community more effectively so that his town or city will become an excellent place in which to live and to explore all possible means to increase, International understanding for Peace and Goodwill.

President Soli Pavri, I now present you Charter of admission into this fold of Rotary International and congratulate you and your fellow members on having a great distinction of being a Chater members of your Club, and I wish you all every success and rewarding experience of accomplishing something worth while towards promoting objects of ROTARY.

In conclusion, I express my gratitude to the Members of Bombay North Rotary Club for this wonderful opportunity, afforded to me this evening.

Not quite understanding, but believing in his teacher, the boy kept training. Several months later, the sensei took the boy to his first tournament. Surprising himself, the boy easily won his first two matches. The third match proved to be more difficult, but after some time, his opponent became impatient and charged; the boy deftly used his one move to win the match. Still amazed by his success, the boy was now in the finals. This time, his opponent was bigger, stronger, and more experienced. For a while, the boy appeared to be overmatched. Concerned that the boy might get hurt, the referee called a timeout. He was about to stop the match when the sensei intervened. "No," the sensei insisted, "Let him continue." Soon after the match resumed, his opponent made a critical mistake: he dropped his

guard. Instantly, the boy used his move to pin him. The boy had won the match and the tournament. He was the champion. On the way home, the boy and sensei reviewed every move in each and every match. Then the boy summoned the courage to ask what was really on his mind.

"Sensei, how did I win the tournament with only one move?" "You won for two reasons," the sensei answered. "First, you've almost mastered one of the most difficult throws in all of judo. And second, the only known defense for that move is for your opponent to grab your arm." left The boy's biggest weakness had become his biggest strength. Unconsciously we all seem to compare our "weaknesses" with the "strengths" of others and fall victim to incompleteness in ourselves.
