This small amount would give a fresh meaning of life to the affected, a worthy cause to render our generosity to the first batch of 16 patients. An appeal was made and in no time we had willing donors to attend to all the 16. My sincere thanks to these members for their forthright support, their names shall appear in a separate column in this edition.

The Medical division of the Vocational Services committee headed by Ashutosh Palep had participated in the Polio Plus drive with an active presence of our members Firoz

Kachwalla, Asim Nagree, Saifu Saria and Dipak Pinge at our Rotary Centre Worli BDD to join our social worker and BMC nominated officials. Mahendra Thacker, Gautam Gandhi, Ashok Kadakia, Suhit Jhaveri and Mandar Tamhe have had a series of meetings to implement rural community services programme covering solar, water and Balwadis for the Adivasi residents of Neral Matheran belt. Firoz, Quresh, Gautam and Asim are busy structuring two mega projects involving eve care in association with Titan Industries Limited and Rotary club of Baltimore. I will furnish more details in my next communication, hopefully at a matured stage.

As for fellowship events, we will have a separate column covering their activities except to add that we are all set for Goa and Jodhpur outstation trips which can still accommodate any member who would still like to register. n Saturday, the 6th of August, the Willingdon club dining room was buzzing with activity. The rain drizzling away and the view through the French windows added a serene atmosphere to the felicitation ceremony for the skin bank donors kin. The air had aromas of delicious breakfast being served to the invitees. The breakfast was enjoyed by one and all. The hall was full with the invitees, the members, their spouses and their guests. President Ajeet them welcomed the chief guest and the members in the audience The President spoke about the skin bank and how Rtn. Dr. Satya Agarwala, Dr. Sunil Keswani and the team had worked hard to make this a success story. He opined that it would be useful to have more collection centres rather than have skin banks. This would be possible due to the fact that collection or distribution could be done efficiently through a well managed logistic approach. Carrying out Corrective surgery and re habilitation of victims was a challenge and the skin bank had identified sixteen such victims. The

cost of each victim would be Rs. 20,000. His request for pledging from the audience was overwhelming with 16 people agreeing to pledge in no time which included Ajeet Arenja, Baldev Arora, Sonal Agarwala, Dinesh Toprani, Hitesh Sharma, Zain Quettawala, Kirit Kothari, Harshad Sheth, Mahendra Thacker, Gautam Gandhi, Badar Maskati, Ashok Ajmera and yours truly. There are a few more whose names are not reflected. I urge you to kindly contact me immediately so that the same can be mentioned in next month's Inspiration and we can acknowledge this wonderful gesture from you. This gesture showed unanimous support to the skin bank from the RCBN family and was also a reflection of the large hearts that our members have towards charitable issues.

Dr. Keswani explained how Satya worked to make his dream a reality. Satya and RCBN members had been coming regularly to the National Burns Centre and propagating the cause through seminars of skin collection in public, through district and other Rotary clubs. He also recalled how Satya worked relentlessly when the project was

implemented and how he achieved the target date for the inauguration. The Burns Centre were clueless of what equipment and from where it was being procured by Satya. The entire liaisoning from finance to mobilisation of equipment to coordinating with the skin bank in Holland was a one army job being handled by Satya. Satya then proceeded with giving his plans for the future. He planned to work with the district, various NGO's and hoped to have a broad foundation for the expansion of the skin bank. He thanked Dr Keswani and his team for making his dream come true. He also thanked the kin and the relatives who had this project possible. Dr Sneha then took over and acknowledged the kin of the skin donors who had gathered. A memento was presented to all of them. Each one of them praised the efforts of the skin bank. It was expressed by most that the procedure of collection of skin was a simple procedure and was carried out without any problem. They all urged members to pledge as a family for this noble cause. The NGO's were also recognised and a memento presented to them.

Cosmopolitan Heritage of the West Coast of India - Contributed by Rtn. Yash Kale

he first non-Indian source that clearly mentions the coastal belt on either side of Mumbai, is the Greek Geography of Ptolemy. It refers to 'Konkan' but as part of the coast of only two provinces. Ferishta and Khafi Khan are more precise and speak of various low-lands inhabited by Banias, Prabhus, Shenvis and other castes, and differentiate between Tal-Kokan and Ghat-matha. Vengurla rocks are recognized by all, the Portuguese name being Ilheos Queimados. Among the British colonial historians the famous H.H. Wilson says 'Konkan' included nearly the whole of the west coast of India, while Grant Duff refers to it as the coast of Gujarat, Deccan and Kanara.

The history and Social fabric of the West Coast of India is not practicable to separate as between pre and post Muhammedan conquest, because the immigration is of fascinating antiquity and continuity. Egyptian vessels docked regularly at Kalliena (Kalyan). Byzantine traders visited at Sopara and places near Bassein. traders were regulars at Janjira, which was subsequently conquered by Abyssinians known in Indian history as 'Siddis'. Many Konkani Musalmans are lineally descended from old Arab settlers. A Greek named Odoricus affirmed in his diary

about passing over from Ormuz in 28 days to Thana, and in Thana finding 15 houses of "Nestorian Christians who were 'Schismatics' and thus Heretics". Persians, Portuguese and Bene Israelis frequented Barugaza (Bharuch) and Muziris (Mangalore) and of course it is commonly known that Parsis alighted and spread at Sanjana, Diu, Dahanu, Tarapore and Nargol. The Chitpavans of coastal Maharashtra are not excluded from this human cocktail, because, although branded as Koknasthas, their origins remain obscure, and the most palpable theory seems to be that their ancestors were Greek Ptolemy administrators fleeing after Cleopatra's death from Roman pursuit via Red Sea, eventually crashing on Kokan coast, southward of Mumbai.

Sanskrit English Dictionary by Moinier Williams commissioned by the Board of Directors of the East India Company defines Kokan as a 320-mile coastal tract of narrow breadth. The etymology of the word Konkan is reportedly from the root Konkana, the maiden name of the mother of Parshuram, the coastal hero. Unsurprisingly, the first mention of Konkan occurs in the Bhishma Parva of Mahabharata, as Bhishma was a not-so-favourite disciple of Parshuram, in archery.

Given constraints of space, it is difficult to list fillers of general interest about the *Portuguese* whose contributions were immense. Portugal, a nation of just one million total population in the 15th century, circum-navigated the world and established Global connectivity before the wireless, through its nodal coastal forts from Hormuz to Macau controlling shipping routes with their system of *Cartaz*. Portuguese were in control of *Mumbai* until *1665*, when it was ceded to British; and of *Bassein* until *1739* when Peshwas took-over.

It would have been profane for a bean-counter like me to attempt a narration unerringly focussed on a cultural and geographic enigma of considerable interest, but for a happy accident that, my childless maternal uncle appointed Lt. Governor of Goa, Daman & Diu in 1965 gave me access to the Cabo Palace library in Goa during my last, long vacation before exile to the drudgery of accountancy training in England. Later in life I enjoyed volumes at public libraries that offered insight into Indian West Coast heritage with all the usual maritime rabble encountered throughout the pages of any respectable book of world history, imploding the prejudices and narrow conditionings of my own mind.

One CEO alone remains on board the jet, seeming very calm indeed. Asked why he is so confident in this first


uncrewed flight,

I traveled to Las Vegas, Cleveland, Georgia, Atlanta, Washington DC and New York City.



I also got the wonderful opportunity to broadcast live on the radio, on WNYR 98.5 FM, with Jim Schreck and Dee. It was a wonderful learning experience! I got to meet two amazing people who were aces in their field. I learned the trades and tricks of being live on air. I also got to write a weekly column in the daily newspaper of my region: 'The Fingerlake Times'. I was so grateful that I could make full use of the opportunities given to me.



The best part of my exchange program was making new friends from all over the globe. I made wonderful friends in school who helped me adjust to the academic climate in Waterloo; and of course, making friends from Argentina, Brazil, Denmark, Slovakia, Finland and many other places. irst of all - Happy Birthday to each of us and a special 50th Happy Birthday to Sultanbhai, Ramanbhai and Babulalji. Our Club is now 50 years old and by the time you read this, we will have celebrated this moment in time in grand style.

We live in a world where we hear a lot of stories from other people. These stories are often about people we know. They are related by those whom we know as well. And we make our conclusions of the people whose stories are told to us based on what we hear from the story-tellers. Socrates, the great Greek philosopher, had a different spin on it. He used what was called the "Triple-Filter Test". I reproduce this test which has been very useful for me over the years and I trust this will help each of you in life—

One day an acquaintance met the great philosopher and said, "Do you

know what I just heard about your friend?". "Hold on a minute," Socrates replied. "Before you talk to me about my friend, it might be good idea to take a moment and filter what you're going to say. That's why I call it the triple filter test. The first filter is Truth. Have you made absolutely sure that what you are about to tell me is true?". "Well, no," the man said, "actually I just heard about it and..." "All right," said Socrates. "So you don't really know if it's true or not. Now, let's try the second filter, the filter of Goodness. Is what you are about to tell me about my friend something good?". "Umm, no, on the contrary...". "So," Socrates continued, "you want to tell me something bad about my friend, but you're not certain it's true. You may still pass the test though, because there's one filter left-the filter of Usefulness. Is what you want to tell me about my friend going to be useful to me?" "No, not really." Well," concluded Socrates, "if what you

want to tell me is neither true, nor good, nor even useful, why tell it to me at all?"

Also, I have one other thought to share with each of you. No matter what moment of life you are in, always say to yourself," This is what I need." It may look like a wreck, but go at it as though it were an opportunity, a challenge. If you bring love to that moment - not discouragement - you will find the strength is there. Any disaster that you can survive is an improvement in your character, your stature, and your life. Then, when looking back at your life, you will see that the moments which seemed to be great failures followed by wreckage were the incidents that shaped the life you have now.
